

Bowen Theory:

A view from the 21st Century Science, Differentiation, Schizophrenia, and Symptom Development

This conference draws on four sources to present a 21st Century view of Bowen Theory. The first source is from science. It reviews a relatively new theory of how cancers develop, called Tissue Organization Field Theory. This challenge is important to Bowen Theory because it represents a shift from cause-and-effect thinking to systems thinking.

The second source is a recent biography of Denis Diderot. Part of the discussions will be to challenge the audience to estimate Diderot's basic level of differentiation and to present the evidence the estimate is based upon.

The third source concerns the so-called negative symptoms of schizophrenia. (Delusions and hallucinations are referred to as the positive symptoms of schizophrenia. The negative symptoms revolve around the phenomenon of avolition, the severe lack of initiative to accomplish purposeful tasks.) Bowen Theory's concept of "self" or lack thereof, is a better way to conceptualize negative symptoms.

The final source is a novel by John Williams entitled "Stoner." It may be a novel, but it is consistent with the way Bowen Theory conceptualizes symptom development. It illustrates that it is essential to understand changes in the family/social context as an extremely important process in symptom development.

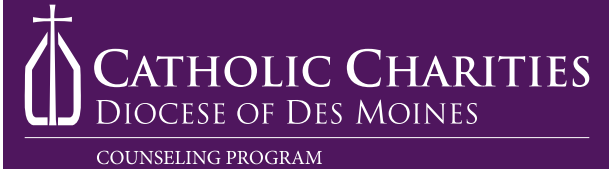

About the Presenter

Dr. Kerr's latest book is **Bowen Theory's Secrets: Revealing the Hidden Life of Families** published in 2019.



Michael E. Kerr, M.D. is a family psychiatrist. He is Director of the Bowen Theory Academy in Islesboro, Maine and Emeritus Director of the Bowen Center for the Study of the Family in Washington, D.C. The Academy's mission is primarily to address the distinction between systems thinking and cause-and-effect thinking as applied to the family and other human relationship systems. Psychiatrist Murray Bowen originated Bowen Family Systems Theory based on extensive family research. The most important practical application of the theory is the process differentiation of self. Differentiation is a blueprint for changing oneself in ways that have a constructive impact on others and on the overall functioning of a group.

Dr. Kerr co-authored with Dr. Bowen a widely used text entitled, Family Evaluation: An Approach Based on Bowen Theory. The book was excerpted in The Atlantic Monthly in 1988. He has also published many book chapters and journal articles about how families function. His primary research interests are the interplay of mind, body, and relationships and its role in health and disease and the interface between Bowen theory and the natural sciences. He has lectured on Bowen theory and its various applications all over the United States and overseas. One of his strengths is presenting theoretical ideas in a way that most people can identify as relevant to their interests and activities, most particularly to their own families.
